
I am looking forward to 2021 and can't wait to see where the next year brings us! Wishing you nothing but happiness in the new year.

Woman's Club 1964 - Celebrates 20 Years

The history of the Historical Society and the Woman's Club begins with the origination of the Historical Society which was suggested by the Woman's Club to the City Council -- but that is a story for another Forecaster! One of the many benefits of working with the Historical Society is uncovering our own history. We have included with this Forecaster the presentation given by members Helen Isberg, Sadie Fischer and Betty Moriarity on February 26, 1964 on the occasion of the 20th Anniversary of the Camellia Festival. We encourage you to read in its entirety.

Helen begins with the origins of the City Slogan "Home of Camellias" and the beginning of the Camellia Festival. Sadie goes on to describe how, in 1931, the Woman's Club utilized every dime in their account to purchase the lot, on which the Clubhouse stands, for \$600, and the numerous purposes for which the building was used. Betty then concludes with how the Club serves the community from, co-sponsoring a youth program with Kiwanis, working with the Chamber of Commerce to welcome new residents, and providing an award for "Best Marching Group" for the Camellia Festival. While this presentation was written nearly 57 years ago, our Club continues to be an integral part of the Temple City community, something we can all be proud of.



Temple City Woman's Club

February 26, 1964

Did You Know? Helen Isberg, I am "Did". Sadie Fischer, I am "You"
Betty Moriarity, I am "Know".

Helen: As "Did" on this 20th birthday of our Camellia Festival we want to tell you that in November 1944 our member Mrs. Dan Crowley inspired a Temple City Community Slogan Contest which was won by our member Mrs. Ralph Sanders. The Slogan-"Temple City the Home of Beautiful Camellias". Thus sprung the Camellia Festival idea and the first crowning of a Camellia Queen little six month old Sharon Ray Pearson. Residents were urged to plant at least one camellia bush in their yards; merchants decorated their windows and the camellia seal of Temple City was on its way to fame.

On March 16,1945, our Queen Sharon rode in a phaeton car transformed into a Camellia decked bassinet down Las Tunas Blvd. The coronation was held at our Park with James Keyes, Vice President of the Temple City Chamber Commerce officiating. The Horizon Girls Club was the guard of honor (our present's daughters were in that group). The Santa Anita School orchestra lead by our late beloved Philip Memoli played for our Queen. The rain was feared like always each year, and complete plans had been made to hold the coronation in the TempleCity Woman's Clubhouse is showers occurred, for in those days all community affairs were held there. Thus ends my little part "Did". Now to "You" Mrs. Fischer.

Sadie: AS"You" did YOU know this club house was built on a lot costing \$600 in 1931 leaving only \$5 in the Building Fund. In 8 years the fund had reached \$2800, enough, we felt to borrow \$8500 more to akilow us to build. We were practical enough to see that we could provide a library for the community which would also bring us revenue to apply on our loan. In 1941, at the completion of our building, contrary to popular jokes, the building committees were to return \$68.66 to the treasury, a savings on the contract.

Did you know that during the War this building was used as the Civilian Defense Relief Headquarters and used by the Red Cross for their sewing center, Blood Bank, Canteen Neutrition, First Aid and home nursing classes, in addition part of our table and chairs were loaned to the surgical dressing rooms.

Did you know that our Club was the first home for the 1st Baptist Church, the Presbyterian, The Seven Day Adventist and others? All this was accomplished because six women conceived the idea in 1925 of forming a club for Temple.

Sadie: (Following Betty's remarks) Speaking of budget, did you know that our net worth today is approximately \$85,000. Last year when we installed our present heating system it was designed to carry an air conditioning to serve the present building, plus a dining room, which, we hope would complete the original plans for our building that one day might provide the facilities for a dignitaries luncheon as part of the Camellia Festival.

Betty:- And As "Know" Did you Know that this Club House has given the Women's Club further opportunity to serve its community. The flower shows were a part of our program until the L.A. County Arboretum was crated. That Adult Education classes were given the use of our building until the High School was ready, that the Indoor Sports Club, sponsored by the Jr. Women's Club, was welcomed until the park recreational building was available.

Did you know that the Women's Club, recognizing the need for wholesome recreational for our youth, co-sponsored with the Kiwanis Club a program where young people could dance and play games thus keeping them off the streets and drive-in spots.

In pre-clubhouse days the Women's Club initiated many services in TempleCity. Did you know that a former president of the Club Mrs. Dunlap, in 1930 trimmed the first community Christmas Tree in the park. Thereafter Mrs. Dunlap and Mrs. Husong continued to do this until the tree outgrew them, and the merchants decided to do something about holiday decorations.

Did you know in 1939 before Welcome Wagon Days, The Women's Club members joined with the Chamber of Commerce to welcome new members to Temple City? and, in 1944 and 45 we sponsored a lecture course and an artist's series? Also in 1945 we organized the Junior Women's Club and their service to Temple City has been unlimited and we are justly proud of them?

To our members the Club offers a rounded program, entertainment, education and opportunity for service. We have twice monthly luncheons followed by cultural lectures or music programs; we have a card section that meets twice a month, an Art and Drama and Music Section, also an American Home and Garden Section meeting once a month.

We are a federated club which makes us a part of a large national and international organization, whose aims and projects we share and support. We have a Philanthropic Comm ittee Chairmaned by Mrs. Ballwhich serves our area institutions. These women have given 4,573 hours of work to the City of Hope, Pacific Hospital and Mc Laren Hall in the past year and a half. Many card parties, fashion shows and dinners areheld in this clubhouse to raise money to contribute to local drives, to support teaching, art and nursing scholarships to help local and county educational projects. We are proud that our name marks three plantati ns of pine trees in the San Gabriel Mountains, these trees we bought that we might share in the state project for Conservation of Natural Resources. Our scope of interest and activity is wide and varied and thus we will continue to expand, and of course this takes an ever
